Migration was discussed during FADs and GAs in the region since 2015. 7 FADs and 3 GAs. 3 motions were debated, voted upon and sent to the OCB Gathering and the IGA since 2015. OCB has operations in South Africa and they responded to Xenophobic violence and migration issues. The Association joined hands in awareness raising. Association members joined a coalition of local NGOs and CSOs who raised awareness against xenophobic violence. Led by a CSO called Section 27 who champion the legal rights of beneficiaries.
